
Established state ethics commission in Article XIV of the North Dakota

Constitution


Commission has authority over transparency, corruption, elections, and lobbying

Rulemaking Authority



Ethics Commission authority - transparency, corruption, elections, and lobbying

Attorney General Opinion 2020-L-09

Read rules in harmony when reasonable and workable.

Conflict with other ethics rules?
Ethics Commission rules prevail.

City of Fargo v. Ruether, 490 N.W.2d 481 (N.D. 1992).

Rulemaking Process

Ethics Commission ≠ Administrative Agency

Administrative Agencies Practice Act includes the Ethics Commission for specific sections

"Agency" and "commission"

Proposed Rule → Notice → Comments and Hearing

→ Respond to Comments → Final Approval →

Publication



Lobbyist Gifts Prohibited

Article XIV

"A lobbyist may not knowingly give, offer, solicit, initiate, or facilitate a gift to a public official."

"A public official may not knowingly accept a gift from a lobbyist. These prohibitions do not apply if the lobbyist is an immediate family member of the public official."

Gift = thing of value not given in exchange for fair market consideration

Who is a Public Official?



SHSND 00114

Public Official =

- elected or appointed members of legislative and executive branches
- members of the Ethics Commission
- legislative employees

Does NOT include: Judicial branch employees, local officials, or non-appointed executive branch employees

Who is a Lobbyist?



Exclusions:

legislators, private citizens appearing on own behalf, government employees, individual invited to provide info, and business representatives introduced by a lobbyist

Includes:

Registered Lobbyists and

Individuals who attempt to influence your actions or decisions.

Commission Creates Exceptions

Constitution directs Commission to create exceptions to the gift prohibition.

"In order to advance opportunities for North Dakota residents to meet with public officials in educational and social settings inside the state, any item, service, or thing of value given under conditions that do not raise ethical concerns, as determined by rules adopted by the ethics commission."



Public or Private Events

Public social and educational event or

Private social and educational event

Exceptions to the lobbyist gift prohibition largely focus on providing food for immediate consumption only.

Need:

- (1) educational component
- (2) person who is not a registered lobbyist or a public official
- (3) notice filed with the Ethics Commission by event sponsor

Educational Component



Advisory Opinion 22-02

"An educational component of a private or public social and educational event should serve to inform the public officials about a topic, issue, or problem and provide helpful and thorough review of the topic, issue, or problem based upon the unique knowledge, skills, or research from the lobbyist."

Best practice: Presentation outlining the topic, issue, or problem with analysis by the lobbyist.

Informal Events

Informal social and educational events allowed

Food or beverage for immediate consumption

\$10 limit, excluding gratuity


Lobbyist can purchase \$10 food and drink item(s)

Additional Exceptions

- (1) A gift by a lobbyist who is a member of the public official's immediate family
- (2) Any item where the public official pays fair market value
- (3) Purely informational material
- (4) A campaign contribution



Out-of-State Events



Commission exceptions only apply in North Dakota.

Advisory Opinion 23-02: Recognizes a spectrum of

out-of-state events

Factors to Consider:

- (1) Overarching objectives
- (2) Topics of presentations
- (3) Scope and type of invitees
 - (4) Materials provided
- (5) Communications received

Gifting Recap



- (1) Ethics Commission exceptions apply only in-state.
- (2) Food and drink = for immediate consumption only, must have educational component
- (3) Reimbursement by sponsor? Must be working beyond attending to learn and eat.

Inadvertent Acceptance



Commission recognized inadvertent giving or receiving a prohibited gifts.

To Remedy:

- o Return gift unused within 10 days,
 OR
- o Pay market value for the gift within 10 days.

Penalties for Violations

Set by the Legislature during 2019 Session

Ethics Commission assesses civil penalties

Civil penalty up to 2 times the value of the gift
